Speech work

Consonants /f/ and /v/

Description of consonant /f/: voiceless labio-dental fricative.

Consonant /f/ is produced when the upper teeth have a contact with the lower lip while air is gradually released (sibilant). It is a voiceless sound. The sound is common with the following letters:

- 1. Letter 'f' e.g. fan, fish, fence, face, fry, fable, film, frame, fin, face, four, five, etc.
- 2. Letters 'ff' e.g. off, office, official, offence, offering, offer, etc.
- 3. Letters 'ph' e.g. phrase, phase, physics, Philosophy, phlegm, photo, Joseph, etc.
- 4. Letters 'gh' e.g. laugh, cough, tough, etc.

Description of consonant /v/: voiced labio-dental fricative.

Consonant /v/ is produced with the same organs of speech used in producing consonant /f/. The only difference is while consonant /f/ is a voiceless sound, consonant /v/ is a voiced sound. /v/ is common with these letters:

- 1. Letter 'f' e.g. of
- 2. Letter 'v' e.g. van, vase, vehicle, vine, volume, vouch, vice, video, drive, grave, brave, save, rave, knives, loaves, love, curve, voodoo, etc.
