During this year's world kidney day, which was marked on March 11, 2010, __86__ experts in the country raised the alarm over increasing cases of __87__ failure. They said that the condition __88__ about 45,000 Nigerians. New cases were estimated to be between 14,000 and 15,000 every year. The total number being managed in the country stands at about 1,000. It is also likely that some of the __89__ are not managed by the experts, while some __90__ blame the condition on witches or other supernatural causes.

The upsurge in cases of __91__ failure has been blamed on lack of __92__ on the part of patients, and the general health practiontioners. There are about 50 __93__ centres in the country and most of them are located in urban areas.
